

Hop Breeding, New varieties, & new uses for common or less utilized varieties

- I. Hop Breeding
 - a. General Breeding why is it done?
 - 1. To increase vigor or yield
 - 2. To improve flavor or create new ones
 - 3. To combat disease and insect susceptibility
 - b. Hops are dioecious separate male and female plants
 - 1. Where breeding is done, great care needs to be in place to assure no cross-contamination, the pollen is wind born
 - c. New breeds require 7 to 10 years or more to develop
 - 1. Crosses are intentionally done from both male and female parent lines
 - 2. As many as 100,000 seeds are collected from each pollenated cross
 - 3. Those 100,000 seeds are germinated, rogued, subjected to multiple disease pressures, but mainly Powdery & Downy Mildews
 - 4. From those survivors <=10,000 are kept, potted up, then a 2nd roguing occurs
 - 5. Year 2- 1000 of the 10000 are selected
 - 6. Years 3-5 Intermediate Selection: Remaining plants transplanted to 18' trellis 1% selection rate
 - 7. Years 6-8 Advanced Selection: Expand selections to multi-hill plots, 2% selection rate
 - 8. Years 9-11 Elite Selection: Expanded to Commercial Lots, ? % selection rate
 - 9. Year 11+ Commercial Production- TO RELEASE OR NOT TO RELEASE, THAT IS THE QUESTION
- II. SOME OF THE NEWER BREEDS THAT HAVE COME OUT IN THE LAST COUPLE DECADES
 - a. American Types Citra, Simcoe, Amarillo, Mosaic
 - b. German Types Polaris, Hüll Melon, Mandarina Bavaria, Hallertauer Blanc
 - c. Other areas- Slovenia, Japan (Sorachi Ace), New Zealand, others...
- III. NEW USES FOR COMMON or LESS UTILIZED VARIETIES
 - a. There are over 100 commercially available varieties out there, with only a couple dozen used primarily. There's a lot to play around with.
 - b. Regional Differences in hop aromas just starting to be realized with MI vs. PNW flavors and aromas
 - c. There are more "dual-purpose" hops than you might realize. Many high alphas, because they also have high oils, can have fantastic aromas- you just have to be careful not to create a bitter bomb. Cases in point: HHF Nugget, HHF Chinook-wet & pelleted, Polaris (Germany) 18-24% alpha, up to 4.4 mg/100g oil content- fantastic aromas
